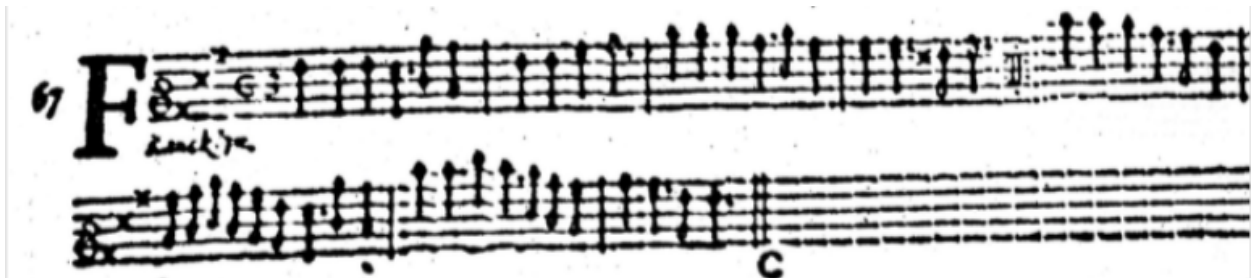

Activity description	<p>Without violin</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Clap following sequence for steady pulse and feeling of the bar</li> </ul> <p>RH on RL/RH taps LH/RH on RL LH on LL/LH taps RH/LH on LL</p> <p>With violin</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Think in two-bar phrasing</li> <li>Repeated notes should be played light</li> </ul>
Suggested age/year group	<p>7+</p> <p>Sing 3rd year</p> <p>Play 3rd year</p>
Musical goals (short and long term)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Repeated notes light</li> <li>Bar hierarchy and tucking in the V in a continuous motion</li> </ul>
