Artistic Research Fellows Conference - Details: Introduction

Due to many requests from research fellows, supervisors and institutional representatives, the format of the Autumn Conferences has been changed in order to facilitate an opportunity to present and discuss Artistic Research Projects in environments where they are created and normally presented.

The first of these conferences is a collaboration between the Oslo National Academy of the Arts (KHiO), the Norwegian Academy of Music (NMH) and the Steering Committee. Consequently, the first day of this conference will take place at KHiO and the second day at NMH. The two institutions has been given the opportunity to present what they see as the most important projects under their respective umbrellas – with a certain emphasis on their own research fellows' projects.

The Spring Conference 2012 will return to Voksenåsen, with a full range of research fellows' presentations. The Steering Committee hopes that the next Autumn Conference can be arranged in collaboration with some of the other institutions that participate in the Programme.



Monday 17th:

What constitutes Artistic Research?

The main theme on the first day of the conference circles this issue, and is addressed through several parts of the programme:

- Keynote by professor Dieter Lesage (b. 1966) Professor of Philosophy at the Department of Audiovisual and Performing Arts Rits (Erasmus University College Brussels) and Professor of Art Criticism at the Vrije Universiteit Brussel. He published widely on nationalism, racism, multiculturalism and globalisation and curated several international group exhibitions. With Kathrin Busch, he is the editor of A Portrait of the Artist as a Researcher. The Academy and the Bologna Process (Antwerp, MuHKA, 2007). With Ina Wudtke, he is the author of Black Sound White Cube (Vienna, Loecker, 2010). Dieter Lesage lives in Berlin.
- Five parallel sessions where five of the research fellows from KHiO discuss together with a chosen partner their own projects
- A panel/plenary session where the five discussion partners from the parallel sessions presents what
 they see constitutes artistic research in each of these projects and discuss this together and with our
 keynote speaker.

Inverted room – Textile Reading in Literature

Reflection in use of textile material in literature/philosophy as motivation for artistic expression and teaching of contemporary textile, presented by Associate Professor Hans Hamid Rasmussen, Oslo National Academy of the Arts, Dept. of Textile Arts.

At the moment he is participating at Gothenburgs International Bienalle at the Museum of Udevalla.

Tacit Zone – Experiences from a Joint Project in Paris

Dean Stein Rokseth, Faculty of Design, KHiO and Associate Professors Kjell Tore Innervik, NMH presents a music performance and installation project in the Pompidou Centre in Paris, part of the Jeudi programme in the Centre.

Associate professor Theodor Barth, KHiO will present his report interceptions@centre_pompidou from the project. This report is an archive-documentary from the Tacit Zone with these main focuses: What does the knowledge-audit look like at the end of a project-co-operation; What do we bring back to our professional area as a result of this co-operation; What are the experiences we would bring on board of a new co-operative project? Barth is Dr. Philos. in anthropology and his main domains are research & methodology on the KHiO MA-programme in design.

Opera presentation

A company from KHiO will give a 30 minute presentation from the opera literature, selected scenes in rehearsal for opening night later in October.

Supervisors' Seminar - Details

Why Supervisors' Seminar?

The Steering Committee finds it necessary to highlight and focus on challenges specific for the task of supervision in this Programme, and contribute to establish a peer culture between the supervisors for support and development. One of the intentions is also to include new supervisors in the collegial group. The outcomes of the seminars may contribute internationally to the discussion on supervising artistic research projects.

In the future, the Supervisors' Seminar may be arranged every year. Adequate forms and content will be discussed in the end of this seminar.

Participants:

The seminar is open for supervisors in the programme, the Steering Committee and one representative from the leadership of each institution that is part of the Programme.

Format:

We will use the highly qualified competence within the group itself. Discussions will be moderated in smaller groups, max 10-12 participants, by the Steering Committee and others involved in the planning. We aim for an open and generous collegial atmosphere in these discussions.

Short and focused introductions prepared by some of the supervisors will frame relevant themes for discussions. The following themes will be in focus during this seminar:

• Ownership to the fellow's project

The amount of the supervisor's involvement in the fellow's project

The nature of the involvement

The balance of general suggestions/critique and concrete suggestions
Introductions by Artist/Supervisor Markus Degerman and Professor Anne Grete Eriksen

Supervision on the reflective process

Close connection between reflective and artistic work - a challenge?

Artist as supervisor - a challenge when it comes to the reflective part?

Cooperation or not between different supervisors' competence
