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## **UPDATED PRESENTATION**

Rehearsing memories - Naming the dead.

Performative aspects of political loss

My proposal to the  $11^{\rm th}$  SAR international conference was an online participatory presentation. Specifically, I would have presented video fragments of my postdoctoral research and invite the audience to share any relevant experience and/or memory of cases of political loss.

My postdoctoral research¹ deals with political loss and its public manifestation both as a social traumatic experience and a generator of collectiveness, solidarity and resistance. In the practical level, I create mnemonic performances using image-based digital media to expose the 'appearances' of the tragically wronged deceased in public memory, space and time. I have taken as a starting point the case of the 34-year-old antifascist rapper Pavlos Fyssas who was murdered by members of the neo-Nazi party Golden Dawn on September 18, 2013, in Keratsini, a suburban area of Piraeus, Greece to address questions such as: How does this political loss produce temporalities of memory and mnemonic performance? What concerns and what needs arise in art from such an extreme act of censorship as that of the irreversible end of one of its people, of his political artwork and its aesthetic approach? Dealing with this political loss from the point of view of a visual artist/photographer and researcher, I explore these

questions combining social theory with artistic performance and tracing the fact in the intricate field of the interrelations between aesthetics and politics.

Responding to the invitation for an online presentation of the Bergen SAR *Crisis Collective!* conference 2020 lost due to the pandemic, I reformulated my initial proposal to include the developments of my postdoctoral research under the circumstances of the current biopolitics of fear that infiltrates the battle against the coronavirus. The idea to act for saving the 'ruins' of a conference signifies an ethical command towards anything that is lost unjustly. In this sense, the concept of "Suspending Absence" is associated to the ethics I am dealing with in researching modes for mnemonic demonstrations.

In the online aspect of the conference and within the virtual one-page space defined by the electronic platform, I assembly two different modes of exposition:

- 1. A viewing of:
  - The World Upside Down (2020) video duration, 11 minutes
  - the photographic documentation of the *Clepsydra* (2020) public mnemonic performance/ephemeral installation
- 2. An attempt to generate participatory interactivity by allowing/encouraging the visitors of the page to leave their own text comments

Specifically, considering the platform of this online presentation as a site of marking the absence of physical present, I invite the visitors to view the above visual evidence and contribute in transforming this web page to a virtual counter-monument for those who have been lost unjustly in racist and fascist attacks condemned thus, to a continuous absence. Thus, I ask visitors to share other political assassination cases they know of that have taken place either in their own country or elsewhere. Practically, participants may leave the name of the dead, their identity along with the time, place and cause of death at the comments' box.

Embracing the internet as a practice of a long-distance participation, my purpose is to map the trauma route through memorialized encounters of political *phantasma* [ghosts] and generate a conversation on how art research practices can respond to the urgencies and emergencies posed by the current rising of neo-fascist movements in Europe. Moreover, naming the dead is in a way a form of unearthing them, a political action reminding our responsibility towards them, the rise of racism, fascism, biopolitics and the violent attacks against our democracies. All the names mentioned by the visitors will be used at the final stage of this postdoctoral research and

in the form of an audio-visual installation. In this installation, the visitors' identity will remain anonymous.

## **DESCRIPTION OF THE VISUAL MATERIAL**

• The World Upside Down (March 2020) performed video reconfigures time and space through encounters of traumatic experience with social resistance. It contains fragments of several mnemonic events in the forms of street protests, festivals and/or concerts related to the murdered musician Pavlos Fyssas. Produced in 2020, this single-channel digital video with sound, also includes certain image recordings and sound pieces from my conversation with the mother of the murdered rapper, Magda Fyssa and selected sound testimonies from my discussions with members of the anti-fascist audience of the trial against Golden Dawn.

Clepsydra public mnemonic performance/ephemeral installation, which
I realized at the outdoor theatre of Lipasmata Drapetsonas (Drapetsona,
Piraeus, October 2020), interrelates Pavlos Fyssas' murder with other
twenty selected cases of blatant political violence in Greece during the
years of 1978-2020, a period of Metapolitefsi which marks the regime
transition from dictatorship to democracy. Some of the memorialized
lethal incidents were the result of state racism that identifies enemies
outside the population, as in the cases of economic immigrants and/or
refugees; others who lost their lives to the state executive mechanism
(police / special forces) attacking either in the form of groups or

individually; cases of nationalist hate and racist violence to death by citizens attacking either in groups or as individuals.
