Jaya He, Art Program at Mumbai International Airport, Terminal-2, Mumbai, India

Jaya He is Asia's largest public art initiative till now, interpreted through six thematic installations composed of 4000 artefacts juxtaposed with artworks by India's finest traditional and contemporary artists at the Mumbai International Airport Terminal 2, India. Jaya He was conceived as an initiation into the immediate environment and the larger context of the airport, the city of Mumbai and of India as a whole. Reflecting the many-layered story that is India, the collection evolved into an immense multidisciplinary endeavor, like a new museum.

Jaya He brought together designers, artists, artisans, architects, art historians, anthropologists, and conservators with the technicians, all working together to distill and interpret India culturally, aesthetically, historically and socially in a manner that leaves visitors with no doubt that they are in the heart of the South Asian subcontinent.

The project has three sections to it, namely, Thresholds of India, Layered Narratives and Baggage Acclaimed.

Spider Web, Art Program at Mumbai International Airport, Terminal-2, Mumbai, India

A kinetic artwork, Designed and Developed with Rajeev Sethi in collaboration with Rajesh Wangar, a traditional Warli artist from Dahanu, Maharashtra, for Mumbai International Airport's Art Program at Terminal-2 (Jaya He).

Conceived as a prism that moves from the jungle to the pastoral village and then to the urban, this is a kinetic installation containing three individual compositions, each capturing one aspect of the changing way of life among the Warlis as seen through the eyes of a Warli artist.

The scenography of the Jal Mahal (Water Palace) interiors is titled Painted Pleasures and illustrates the notion of pleasure pavilions, celebrating the Rajput courtly arts of the 18th century India. The curators selected the main exhibits and the text around which the space has been visualized and about 40 art works have been conceived while collaborating with 30 traditional miniature painters and craftspeople. The project blends design with art, craft and architecture.
