Using photography and painting to bring his portraits as present to the audience real and life-sized. Hendricks explore the Black American for who they who he is and not going back to African roots but speaking for himself and exploring his community around him. Using his camera as his "mechanical

sketch book" as he calls it is interesting as tool for looking and reference as an instant image maker to work from. Not bothered or shying from nudity when looking at others and himself leading through a confidence that carried through himself and the work he created, being open and honest and laying it all out to be seen by others.
