## March 19-24, 2018

Considering 'communicativity' via a range of somatic, experiential and experimental practices, the Stockholm Practice Week frames some of the many ways that knowledge, information and critique are transmitted and received in the PhD dance context.

What are the feedback processes that might best support and/or propel our personal research practices? How do we create the contexts/cohorts/conditions needed in order to contribute critically to the research practices of our peers, colleagues and fellow artists? How are we working to articulate, materialize and communicate our artistic research to the broader dance community, to other institutions, other fields, fellow artists and audiences?

A range of Scandinavian based PhD candidates, Professors, artist researchers and artists will gather together to share methods, modes of inquiry and research questions. The week will consist of exchanges, conversations and presentations, inviting the participating artists and researchers to share concerns, test practices and to think, talk, dance and walk together.
