a curator who sweats a scent of power

two japanese butoh artists with suspended eyes


all of them working hard to be individual performing

If Michel Foucault was here, he might say that the function of an audience

is not defined by mere attendance of an event but through a series of aesthetic, relational and dialogical procedures. and that,

in theory by default,

and in practice through these procedures,

the audience-function is secondary

to the author-function

- not in terms of value but in terms of procedure or assemblage

and thus to function as an audience

they have to follow

the lead of the authors, at least as a primary orientation

to listen to them


Denis Guénoun would say

as a political act


Roland Barthes could say
